RESIDENTS say a smoking ban at Broadmeadows Health Service is pushing smokers closer to their

Northern Health has prohibited smoking on its sites including car parks and internal courtyards but will not fine offenders.

A month after the policy was introduced, people continue to smoke in carparks and around

the site. Kerry Dodd, who lives behind Broadmeadows Health service on Robinson St, said to some smokers had moved to the roadside in front of her house.

Ms Dodd said there could be up to 20 people smoking outside her house at one time. "It's uncomfortable and horrible, you have no privacy," she said.

Northern Health spokeswoman Maree Cuddihy said support production of the staff, wided included offering staff,

s patients and visitors help to quit smoking. "We do, however, and ticipate that it may take some time to make all patients and visitors aware of the smoke-free policy," she said.

Ms Cuddihy said patients had previously encountered smoke haze at entrances and courtyards of the health facilities.

She said the smoke-free policy would provide a healthier environment.
